## <u>Free-Motion for Today's Quilters – Adele Scott - Products & Tips Outline</u>

<u>Prep:</u> Wash? [if not, quilt more closely] versus not wash? [then use *Color Catchers* when quilt is finally washed]

<u>Batting</u> – Be familiar with your batting's characteristics. <u>Know Your Battings Book</u> Make sure it's had a chance to relax/ or is pressed flat. Use a press sheet like the <u>Bo-Nash ironing mat</u> It allows steam to pass through. Helps with all fabrics, fusibles and stabilizers. No scorching or sticking to batting. One of our all-time favorites!

<u>Basting options</u>, if needed – steam press, basting sprays, fusible batting, make your own with <u>Free Fuse Powder</u> from Quilter's Select - Creating a semi-permanent bond between most fabrics and battings, this sprinkle-on powder is needle friendly and easy to use.

<u>Supplies for free-motion set-up</u> in general and highly recommended for beginners for the best results:

- Good machine [it's always better to use your best machine if possible; having needle stop down, speed control and larger bed space can help] Speed control is your "stitch regulator".
- Good lighting for your machine [ViVilux] or Ott-lite, natural lighting
- Free-motion feet open toe, closed toe, echo foot, Ruler Foot info
- straight-stitch needle plate [optional but really helps purchase from your machine dealer].
- 90/14 Topstitch needles [try <u>Schmetz Chrome topstitch needle 90/14</u>, always start with a new needle in your machine]
- Plexi-glass quilters table <u>Sew Steady Table Options</u> many options now available
- "slider" sheet [try a <u>Sew Steady Grid Glider</u> has a 19" x 12" for a great price]
- All-purpose polyester thread or 50w cotton good for beginners have several colors & types to test, not too dark. Thread must feed smoothly! [Thread Stand Options]
- "grippy" fingertips like <u>Needle Pullers</u>, <u>Swan Amity Quilting Gloves</u>, or Grabaroos
- <u>Crosshair Marking Tools</u> 5, 6 and 8-point plus mini versions. 2 sizes, a time saving way
  to square blocks, find centers, diagonals or "compass", points without continuously
  moving the ruler when marking. Very accurate! And line markers <u>Basic Marking tool</u>
  options for the most accurate lines, grids and placement marks.

• Fabric markers that will show on your choice of fabric colors & remove easily.

<u>Quilters Select Self Erase Marker</u> – has a built-in eraser, doesn't heat set, last for 1-7 days

Marvy Air Erasable Marker - Disappears in a few days, doesn't heat set.

<u>Frixion Fineliner colors available</u> Like other Frixions, it "becomes invisible" with heat but this felt-tip marker is so much smoother to mark with.

Chalk markers like the <u>Chakoner</u> [a Japanese Tailoring tool], we refill with <u>Ultimate</u> <u>Iron Off Chalk</u> using the handy <u>spout bottle</u>

<u>Important</u> – Your elbows need to be above the machine surface/ table when at rest. A cushion to sit on will bring you to a better height or an adjustable height chair.

• Your surrounding needs to be clear of items, fabric supported as much as possible and a slippery surface – you & the table helps.

Quilting with Rulers: The ruler thickness needs to match with machine.

## Handling larger quilts:

Baffling Your Quilt Book – an Auntie's Two version to help handling with large quilts

Bo-Nash ironing mat – press batting & batting tape without sticking or melting

Marti Michell <u>Batting tape Options</u> - joins batting pieces together, less stretchy and wider than most. Comes in two sizes. Use *Bo-Nash Ironing Mat* to press.

<u>Roxanne's E Z Squeezie Glue Baste It</u> – use to temporarily hold fabric instead of pins for free-motion work, bindings, seams etc. [Many product options now available]

<u>Sench Needles</u> – spiral eye for easy threading, perfect for burying your thread ends in quilts.
